#### LS 819: Poetry, Prose, and the Professional Sphere

"Don't tell me what the poets are doing. Don't tell me that they're talking tough. Don't tell me that they're anti-social. Somehow not anti-social enough, that's right." - "Poets," The Tragically Hip

"Who among us has not dreamt, in his ambitious days, of the miracle of a poetic prose?" - Charles Baudelaire

In *Slouching Toward Bethlehem*, Joan Didion tells us she took the title for her essay collection from Yeats' poem because there were lines that "reverberated in my inner ear as if they were surgically implanted there." This line, vivid in itself, represents a starting point for this course: of what benefit is modern poetry to contemporary writing? Despite poetry's reputation as an ineffective and pretentious art, how can its rhythms – and an understanding of its often radical existential and historical project – alter our assessment of the modern condition and the creation of our own written work?

In pursuing these questions, we will study the poetry and prose of modernist and post-modernist writers whose poetic tactics destabilize the conventional through a visceral approach to language and a wild re-ordering of chronological time to mine the energies of the personal and historical past. In tandem, each class member will perform a short oral reading from this body of work to develop the "inner ear" that brings about more concrete and original prose, whether academic, literary or popular. Throughout the course, we will also hear from visiting writers who will speak on the influence of the poetic imagination, read from their writing, and share their own experiences of the professional writing world. All of this will be undertaken not only as graduate-level study but also in applied form as each student writes a long-form prose piece that responds to the themes of the course. This work will then be respectfully workshopped by the class and the instructor with the ultimate goal of publishing in *The Ormsby Review's GLS Journal* and beyond.
